Preschool

Grade School



Kindergarten Science

While studying the science of gravity and force, Kindergarten conducted a marble and ramp experiment. Students paired up to build their own unique ramps using pool noodles and blocks. They made predictions on whether the height of the ramp would change the speed and distance the marble rolled. In addition, they predicted what would happen to the marble when it encountered a cup at the bottom of the ramp.

They also held a Science Day in which four different science experiments were conducted with the assistance of parent volunteers. Students enhanced their engineering skills by building structures with toothpicks and marshmallows, took the sound challenge by guessing which objects were hidden in eggs based on their sound, practiced being chemists with balloons and baking soda, and studied how carbon dioxide gas bubble are formed.





Dental Health

Dr. Carolyn Bronke and her associate visited the Kindergarten class to help the students understand the importance of dental health. They learned surprising facts about how many times a day to brush their teeth, the effects of too much sugar on teeth, and what happens during a visit to the dentist. The students got a chance to ask lots of questions, and Dr. Bronke brought goodie bags for the students practice good dental health at home.

1st Grade STEM

During STEM time on a cold wintry day, 1st graders made a Hot Chocolate Stand using their choice of Legos, Duplos, unifix cubes, wooden blocks, or a combination of any of these materials. Their designs were varied and functional, and they had fun!



Lucky Charms Graphing

2nd graders put their graphing skills to the test by sorting and graphing Lucky Charms marshmallows!

Biography Book Reports

During this trimester, our 2nd graders worked on biography book reports. Most of them presented their reports virtually, thanks to Zoom. Many of the students dressed up as the person they were presenting. They did a great job and were very creative!



Growing Pizza

Our 2nd graders had fun learning about making a pizza! Did you know it takes much longer than 30 minutes to grow a pizza?!

Unique Landforms

In Social Studies lessons, 3rd graders created their own landform islands in the shape of something unique to them. They had to fill the island with different landforms and write about each area of their island.






Hunger Challenge

Our 4th and 5th graders joined youth and educators around the world to investigate how hunger affects education and development and support both emergency relief and long-term solutions for hunger-related issues like malnutrition and food insecurity. The Hunger Challenge is the latest annual challenge by Students Rebuild, a program of the Bezos Family Foundation that mobilizes young people to take action on some of the world's most critical problems. Our 4th and 5th graders participated in the challenge by creating an artistic rendering of "A Recipe for a Virtuous Person". For each piece of artwork we submitted, the Bezos Family Foundation donated \$6 to programs aimed at alleviating malnutrition and hunger-related issues for tens of thousands of children worldwide. We are proud of our

students for their effort in creating and submitting 90 recipes which helped raised \$540 to address hunger and malnutrition all over the world!

Colony Persuasive Ads

5th graders worked on creating advertisements persuading people to come to their colony from the early 1600s. They found ways to write about the areas to make them more appealing using what they learned about the area. The favorite was the Jamestown "mascot" – the mosquito!

Roman Oscars

6th grade Social Studies classes finished a project called "The Roman Oscars." First, each student signed up for an important figure in the history of the Roman Empire and researched that figure. Second, they acted as that figure, intermingling with the class to tell everyone why they deserved the nomination for a particular category. Some of the nomination categories were for "Best General," "Best Emperor," "Worst Emperor," "Best Contributor to Christianity," and others. Third, after collecting evidence from each participant, they returned to their seats and voted for the

nominees using Google Forms. Finally, a small ceremony was held in which the "Oscar" winners were announced and given a certificate, in lieu of a golden statue.

Blackout Poetry

The students in 7th grade Language Arts class did some blackout poetry for one of their End of the Year projects. Students had to make poems out of already written texts and 'black out' whatever words they did not use. The 7th graders could choose from their favorite songs, books, or even speeches. Every year, the students are creative with the texts they choose and the poems that they create from them. It was great to see that the creativity remained, even when doing the projects at home!



Coding Projects

Middle School students did Coding projects from home. 6th grade did a block program and wrote an interactive quiz. The 7th and 8th graders wrote a BASIC program using LOOPS, number and string variables to write a survey.



SJS Girls' Ensemble "Virtual Choir" Video

Members of the SJS girls' ensemble made a "virtual choir" video using one of what would have been their VIP concert songs, "Just Like Fire." The girls rehearsed the song at their homes then individually recorded themselves singing the song. Music teacher Mr. Horneman compiled the videos and worked with a video editor, who stitched the videos and voices all together over the backing track to create the choir sound. Although we weren't able to have the

VIP concert this year, we hope that next school year, our students can all sing together in person.

Both of our 5th grade girls teams won their championship games! Way to go Crusaders!


